## UK Future Chef 2026

January 12th saw Reilly and Hector making their way to Cambridge Regional College to take part in the local finals of the Springboard UK Future Chef 2026 national cooking competition.

This saw pupils from schools in Norfolk and neighbouring counties enter pupils to prepare, cook, and serve two dishes of restaurant quality. Judges included a chef lecturer at the college, representatives from the Royal Navy catering team and David Mulcahy, chair of Springboard UK and vice chair of the Craft Guild of Chefs who later praised both Reilly and Hector for their technical skills and organisational ability.

Hector and Reilly were required to create their own recipe and to provide detailed costings of their dish. They also had to adjust to working in a fully industrial commercial kitchen, adjusting their cooking methods, equipment, and timings as a result. On this occasion, we

were unable to progress further, but having such a high level of competition and being the first time Reepham High has taken part, it was a learning curve for us all.

In passing, as well as congratulating both pupils, we must also thank their parents who were also in attendance, who have also endured pasta and pork chops on multiple occasions over the last month!

The competition, which was open to all our GCSE food pupils is an excellent introduction to the style and quality of food required at GCSE level. Many of our key stage 3 pupils are given an opportunity to 'plate up' their food, which we encourage them to do. Whilst the KS3 rotation is short, such activities ensure we showcase our pupils' abilities at all levels, as well as to enthuse and promote hospitality and product design as future career options.

Reepham High School was one of just 200 schools across the UK to receive some of the rope-grown fresh mussels donated by Offshore Shell, RT Shellfish, the Fishmongers' Society and the

Food Teachers' Centre. When we say 'fresh' we should specify that we received them 48 hours after they'd been harvested, even after a delay due to the stormy weather!

Our pupils produced the classic moules marinière, and there was very little left after multiple second helpings.

The aim of the Mighty Mussels programme is to encourage pupils to use mussels, understand where these come from, seasonality and sustainability issues, source of protein, as well as to support the shellfish industry and to experience the taste and versatility of seafood.

## Portrait Project

In Art, students explore an exciting range of techniques and media throughout Key Stage 3, developing the skills and knowledge needed for progression to GCSE and A Level studies.

In Year 9, students have been working on a portrait project, with a current focus on dry point etching (see image, top right). Dry point etching is a printmaking technique that uses fine lines and expressive mark-making to recreate an image. This process


has been used by many renowned artists, including Rembrandt, Lucian Freud and Paula Rego, who was recently celebrated in an exhibition at the Castle Museum.

For students, this is an excellent process for accessing and developing drawing skills through an alternative approach, helping to build confidence and independence.

The versatility and success of dry point etching are further developed at GCSE, where students select their own subject matter to explore and recreate (left).

This journey culminates at Reepham College, where A Level students specialise in their chosen area, refining their skills and producing highly personal and independent outcomes (lower right).


## Getting Ready for the Slopes
